Q?Crew Volunteer Application The National Museum of Natural History is currently accepting applications to the Q?Crew Teen Volunteer Program.

About the Program

Description

Q?Crew teen volunteers are the passionate and enthusiastic face of the Museum, greeting and orienting visitors from around the world to Q?rius, the Coralyn W. Whitney Science Education Center at the National Museum of Natural History. Q?Crew volunteers encourage visitor exploration of natural history science and culture with fun, experimental and creative hands-on activities, and a collection of 6,000 objects. This program is a way for teens to obtain community service credit in an environment that allows them to connect with peers who share similar interests, learn more about the research that goes on behind-the-scenes in the Museum, and gain valuable public speaking and leadership skills. Each new Q?Crew volunteer will receive training in communication techniques for visitor engagement, natural history science, and collections handling. Q?Crew volunteers participate in behind-the-scenes opportunities, enrichments for skillbuilding, and teen socials.

Program Requirements and Perks

Q?Crew volunteers must attend an onsite training and orientation **June 29 – July 3, 2020;** shadow an experienced volunteer in early July; serve at least two, four-hour shifts per month; and commit to completing at least 100 service hours within a year of starting the program.

Q?Crew volunteers are also required to attend at least **three** additional enrichment opportunities throughout the year that will allow them to dive deeper into their science and communication interests.

Q?Crew volunteers will learn more about science and museum careers while earning Service Learning credit in an engaging and interactive way. Q?Crew volunteers enjoy exclusive museum perks such as: free admission to the Butterfly Pavilion; 20% off in all Smithsonian Museum stores; one free Smithsonian IMAX film per week; and access to Smithsonian Libraries.

Applications must be submitted no later than January 31, 2020. Incomplete applications will not be accepted. If you are mailing in the application packet, it must be post-dated no later than the due date.
